

Dear Parent/Carer

Next week, we are going to be talking about the very serious issue of 'county lines' with our students. County lines refers to the new drug dealing model that urban criminal gangs are using to sell drugs to rural and coastal areas. It is common for these gangs to target and recruit vulnerable school children (some as young as 10) to transport and sell drugs for them. Police forces across the country have reported that county lines activity is evident in most forces across England and Wales. This makes it an important issue for us to educate children and young people about, so they can help keep themselves and others safe from harm.

These lesson materials have been created by VotesforSchools in partnership with Duncan Evans, the NPCC County Lines Lead for Child Exploitation. You will find more information on the topic below.

In this lesson, your child will explore what county lines are, how young people get involved and the signs that may show someone is being groomed or exploited for criminal activity. Your child will be signposted to places where they can go should they need more information or someone to talk to. It is likely that after the lesson, your child may want to talk to you about county lines at home.
