Facial Expression	A drama skill where the actors use their face to show expressions and, or reactions in a performance.

Sound collage	A drama technique in which a combination of sounds, including vocal and instrumental sounds, to create a specific atmosphere or to accompany important moments of a scene.

Cross cutting	A drama technique where two or more scenes which that take place at the same time but in two locations. The scenes are performed one after the other.
Flashback	A drama technique when a scene goes back in time (from the previous scene(s)). To inform the audience about a moment that happened previously.
