CIVIC	1	Become a student librarian Reading Ambassador for at least a term.
	2	Create poster / infographic explaining the importance of and promoting a significant literary event - World Book Day, National Poetry Day, Shakespeare's Birthday as examples.
	3	Take part in an English faculty club over a term.
MORAL	4	Take part in the annual bookmark competition, focusing on the mental health benefits of reading. You can include positive and encouraging quotations from key literary figures.
	5	Create a reading newsletter for other students showcasing books that helped or could help their personal growth - to help others develop passion, courage, gratitude, honesty, humility, integrity, justice, and respect.
	6	Write a letter to a local person of influence - the principal, your local MP, your local council, a religious leader - about an issue you feel strongly about, with possible solutions which they could introduce through their role.
PERFORMANCE	7	Prepare a set of resources on a topic you have studied, to support students who will study it for the first time.
	8	Write and/or deliver a speech to your class, persuading the English faculty to teach a book or author you believe is influential and important.
	9	Produce a persuasive poster to be displayed around school promoting the importance of reading.
INTELLECTUAL	10	Gain at least 10 stamps on your reading canon card over one academic year.
	11	Create a presentation (PowerPoint, video, leaflet as examples) showcasing the influence a writer we study has had on society / the world.
	12	Provide three pieces of evidence of additional revision for a unit of study, beyond your normal homework tasks. You can bring in anything you've created, like flashcards (KS3/KS4), mind maps, (KS3/KS4) evidence of using GCSE pod (KS4) or completion of past papers (Y11).
