<p>Understand what conventions are and specifically what are the key conventions within a musical.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - What are the key conventions of a musical? - Students will see examples of each four conventions: song, dance, orchestra/band and spoken dialogue. - What conventions will you expect to see within Shrek the Musical? - What is the difference between West End and Broadway? <p>Understanding each of the different roles within the making of a production.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - What are theatre makers? Key Vocabulary and Definitions To Be Learnt		What Will The Assessment Look Like?
Live theatre	A live performance which is given in front of an audience rather than being recorded or broadcasted.	<p><i>The way we assess at KS3 is currently undergoing changes due to the introduction of the November and June assessment weeks.</i></p> <p><i>Students will complete several tasks where they will demonstrate competency in a key area, from which class teachers will determine what gaps in knowledge or skills need closing in the next unit of work.</i></p> <p><i>For this unit of work, students will be watching a recorded production of a show, which is followed by reviewing, evaluating and analysing key elements. Students will use these skills to access the current knowledge part of their assessment.</i></p>
Audience	A group of people who participate in a show or encounter a piece of theatre.	
Musical	A theatre production that tells a story through song and dance.	
Broadway	A famous street in New York lined with 41 professional theatre productions	
West-End	The 'West End' is a term used to describe an area in London where theatre productions are put on for audiences.	Family Learning Opportunities
Costume	What is worn by the actors to convey the characters age, status and personality.	
Lighting	Lighting around the stage used to enhance the mood and atmosphere of the performance. Lighting can also be used to convey the time and/or location of the scene.	
Sound/Music	Sound and music is used in the performance to create a mood and atmosphere of the performance.	
Props	A prop, formally known as property is an object used on stage by the actors during a performance.	
Set	Set refers to the scenery of the performance, usually backdrop to locate where the scene is set. 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Make-up	Make-up is used in drama to alter the appearance of the actor to meet the characters description. Actor	Actors or performers are people who entertain the audience by acting, singing or dancing. They play the characters on stage and work with the direction of the director to bring the performance to life.	
Director	The role of the director involves being responsible for the overall artistic vision of the production.	
Designer	The role of the designer work with the director to bring to life the vision of the production, they focus on the lighting, set, sound and costume.	
Semiotics	How meaning is created and communicated on stage through signs and symbols.
