Pull Factor	Something that attracts people to an area e.g., jobs

Migration	The movement of people from one place to another	
Urban	A town or a city – an area that has many buildings	
Rural	The countryside – an area with few buildings	
Birth rate	The number of births per 1000 people per year	
Death rate	The number of deaths per 1000 people per year	
Natural Increase	An increase in population caused when the birth rate is higher than the death rate.	
Infant mortality	The number of babies that die before the age of 1 for every 1000 born per year.
