Site	The actual location of a place	
Function	The reason why a settlement was built e.g., Port, Market Town or Industrial Town	
Population distribution	How people are spread out in an area	
Population density	How crowded an area is. Densely: lots of people. Sparsely: Few people

Push Factor	Something that encourages people to leave and area e.g., war	
Migration	The movement of people from one place to another	
Urban	A town or a city – an area that has many buildings	
Rural	The countryside – an area with few buildings	
Social	Anything to do with people and how they live their lives	
Economic	Anything to do with jobs and how money is made and spent	
Environmental	Anything to do with the natural surroundings	
Opportunities	Something to be taken advantage of	
Challenges	Something that is a problem
